His highly detailed and captivating insect portraits spark curiosity and wonder, encouraging students to explore questions about biology, technology, design, ecosystems, and the role of insects in our world. This programme nurtures creativity, critical thinking, and hands-on discovery while supporting rich cross-curricular learning in Science, Visual Arts, and Technology — all aligned with the Aotearoa New Zealand Curriculum.

MICROSCULPTURE: THE INSECT PHOTOGRAPHY OF

LEVON BISS

TERM 4: 19 July –14 September Year 1- 8 —FREE About the Exhibition

British artist Levon Biss creates large-scale portraits of insects that blend art and science. His exhibition, Microsculpture, features 40 beautiful high magnification portraits that cap ture the microscopic form of insects in striking large format are high resolution tetails. These high resolution images, each stitched together from thousands of microscopic photographs of a single insect.

These portraits reveal textures, colours, and adaptations invisible to the naked eye, inviting ākonga to slow down, look closely, and experience the natural world in completely new ways.

The insects featured are from the Oxford University Museum of Natural History, which holds a collection of over 5 million specimens from across the globe.

Levon Biss has exhibited worldwide in museums and galleries and now his art is here for you to view.

This exhibition work invites curiosity and wonder and provides a rich foundation for classroom learning across multiple subjects.



Our Big Questions This Term

- * Why are insects important in different cultures, including Māori perspectives?
- * How do technology and art help us see the world differently?
- What can we learn by looking closely at tiny things?
- * How can bugs inspire us as artists, designers, and scientists?
- What does this exhibition tell us about being guardians (kaitiaki) of the natural world?
- What happens when we slow down and really look?
- * Where in the world do these insects live, and what makes each one unique?
